A Moment in Black History

The celebration of Black History Month began as "Negro History Week," which was created in 1926 by Carter G. Woodson, a noted African American historian, scholar, educator and publisher.

December 07, 2020- Wixie Annette Stephens was sworn in and took the oath of office and be installed as the First Black Woman to be a Commissioner for Robeson County, North Carolina. She is a member of First Baptist Church Lumberton, NC where she served as the first female chairman of the Trustee Board in 100 years of the Church.

January 10, 2021- Tiffany Powers a Lumberton native were sworn in as the first African American woman to hold a superior court judge position in Robeson County.

January 20, 2021- Kamala Harris became the first woman of African or Asian descent to become vice president. Harris's mother immigrated to the United States from India and her father emigrated from Jamaica.

Lest We Forget

"Lest I forget Thy love for me..." – Lead Me To Calvary

Marcus Garvey stated, "A people without the knowledge of their past history, origin and culture is like a tree without roots". Woodson, the father of Black History, pushed for Black History week until February became Black History Month. Johnson's 'Lift Every Voice and Sing' has a verse that says, "Lest our hearts, drunk with wine of the world we forget Thee;" Paul instructed the church at Rome to not be conformed to this world and the culture that you just fit in but fix your attention on God and be changed from the inside out, knowing what is the good, acceptable and perfect will of God. (Romans 12:2).

The lord wants us to remember all that He's done for us, so that "Shadowed beneath Thy hand, may we forever stand, True to our God, true to our native land".
