

"Lift Every Voice and Sing...." By Pastor Paul Matthews

For Black History Month 2024, I am doing a series from the iconic song that first began as a poem in 1900. The author of this poem turned into song is James Weldon Johnson who was teacher, principal, civil rights activist and lawyer. The poem was first recited by 500 black children in Florida in a tribute to President Abraham Lincoln's birthday. Johnson would cite the poem to introduce Booker T. Washington who was visiting his school, Stanton in Jacksonville, Florida. Johnson's brother, John put the poem to music to make it an official song. In 1919, the NAACP adopted the song as it's official Negro National Anthem.

This song has stood the test of time. It is of one that reminds us of where we have come from, the struggles that we have had to endure, the victories that we have accomplished, and the encouragement to keep on fighting "...till victory is won".

The Scriptures share a similar narrative of what the people of God had to face. The many trials and tribulations that were either imposed by their adversaries or consequences of disobeying God, always had the people returning back to the only true Deliverer, God.

James Weldon Johnson's song was written during a time that our ancestors dealt with Jim Crow, lynching and all manner of attacks and oppositions. The song became a cry of resilience of "facing the rising sun". Being descendant of those who preserved, helps us understand the deliverances God's people receive time and time again as well as the unwavering faith in trusting an Almighty God.

"We have come." from the challenges of the 60's, 70s and even the current opposition. Like this song, my prayer is that these messages along with all the other things shared in this year's Black History Month, we will remain "true to our God" and "true to our native land".
